This year marks the 60th anniversary of the birth of Chautauqua Opportunities, Inc.! The agency's Articles of Incorporation were filed with NY State on May 11, 1965. On June 11 of the same year the Chautauqua County Board of Supervisors approved a local law allocating county funds to COI to ensure that residents could benefit from the Federal Opportunity Act of 1964. The Act spurred the creation of Community Action Agencies nationwide, a network that has grown to over 1,100 member agencies.

The earliest COI programs mentioned in historical documents are the Jamestown Boys' Club "Project Catch Up" and Legal Aid to the Indigent. COI began Head Start operations in December 1965 with a total enrollment of 300 children. Programming that followed soon after included a Medicare Alert Program and Neighborhood Youth Corps. Jamestown Area Meals on Wheels began through COI in 1969.

In the early 1970's, COI further developed its programming to include additional Meals on Wheels programs, senior centers throughout the county, Rural Home Repair Program, Mortgage Default and Rental Delinquency Counseling, Food Stamp Outreach, and Crisis Intervention (food vouchers and fuel delivery). COI began providing the Weatherization Assistance Program and the HUD Housing Choice Voucher Program (Section 8) in the mid 70's. These two programs are still operated by COI. (con't from pg 1) added WIC and HEAP to its growing list of services in the 1980's, along with prenatal care, teen pregnancy prevention, minority outreach, Home Care, housing programs, crime prevention, emergency food pantries, community gardening, and a self-help cannery. Early Head Start was added to COI's services in 1993. WIC transitioned to Catholic Charities in 2010. In 2011, Chautauqua County Department of Social Services began providing HEAP in-house.

COI has grown over the years into a well-known provider of a wide range of services that align with the agency's mission to combat poverty. Current programming includes: **Early Care and Education** (Head Start, Early Head Start, Early Head Start Expansion-Child Care Partnerships, Universal Pre-K); **Health and Family Services** (licensed Home Care, Responsible Fatherhood, Mobile Crisis Outreach, Migrant Farmworker Health Outreach, and homeless youth residential programs); **Housing and Emergency Services** (homeless prevention and rehousing, Hope Haven Women's Shelter, HUD Housing Choice Voucher (Section 8), Fair Housing Outreach and Education); **Home, Business, and Asset Development** (Weatherization, Lead Remediation, HUD Housing Counseling, Homebuyer Education, Foreclosure Prevention, Bankruptcy Counseling, and Credit Counseling); and the **Child Care Council** (Child Care Resource & Referral, child care business development, family day care registration, Family Court Child Care Center, child care provider mentoring and assessments, and USDA Summer Food Program).

**Chautauqua Opportunities for Development, Inc.** (CODI), is COI's affiliate corporation that was initiated in 2002. CODI is a certified Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) providing technical assistance and loans to entrepreneurs for business startup and expansion.

# CCC attends Easter Event at the Safety Village

On Saturday, April 12th, the Chautauqua Opportunities Inc.'s Child Care Council participated in the Safety Village's Bluey Easter Carnival. The COI Building was used to hold a Roller Coaster Simulation on one side of the building. Braving the cold weather, approximately 1,850 people attended the Easter Carnival.









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### Weatherization Manager Prevents Carbon Monoxide Poisoning



In February of 2025, COI's Weatherization Manager arrived at a customer's home to perform an Energy Audit. Upon entering the home, the Weatherization Manager's personal carbon monoxide alarm began to flash, indicating elevated levels of carbon monoxide in the air beyond permissible limits. The manager asked the customer if he had been baking or using the oven for any reason. The

customer stated he hadn't used the oven in quite some time, so the manager immediately stopped the audit and went outside with the customer.

While outside, the manager inquired about the gas appliances in the customer's home and whether he had any carbon monoxide detectors. The customer replied that he only had a gas furnace and had smoke detectors, but no carbon monoxide detectors. At that moment, the manager informed him of a potential carbon monoxide leak inside the home, explaining its implications and the associated risks. As a result, the customer contacted his wife, who left work to take their children to the emergency room for carbon monoxide testing. Later that day, both the customer and his wife were also tested. The customer mentioned that he and his family had experienced headaches at various times but were unaware of the underlying issue.

The fire department was called, and they discovered that the furnace vent had become disconnected from the furnace due to improper installation. The individual who installed the unit neglected to use PVC glue to secure the joints of the PVC pipe. Additionally, there was an open cold air return situated directly below the malfunctioning exhaust, which was pulling the exhaust emissions into the furnace and distributed them along with the heated air throughout the living space of this ranch-style home.

After the home was safely abated due to the hazardous gas, the customer and a member of the fire department worked together to repair the furnace vent. Currently, the home is undergoing Weatherization services that encompass wall insulation, duct work repairs, air sealing, and the installation of new carbon monoxide detectors in both the living area and the basement.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a dangerous, odorless, and colorless gas that can be fatal, especially at high levels, because it displaces oxygen in the blood, starving vital organs. Symptoms can be subtle and mimic other illnesses, including headache, dizziness, nausea, weakness, and confusion. Exposure to high levels can lead to loss of consciousness and death.



## COI's Housing and Head Start Programs Help Homeless Family



Sophia was just two years old when she joined COI's Early Head Start Program in June 2024. Her mother had been referred to the program through COI's Housing division. Sophia's mother, Eileen, was fleeing a domestic violence situation and was temporarily housed in a local hotel with Sophia and her ten-year-old brother. When Sophia first arrived for center-based services, she was a very shy little girl who seldom spoke. However, she has since blossomed, actively engaging with both her peers and teachers. Sophia made a smooth transition to Head Start when she turned three. Eileen has been highly involved in Sophia's education, attending every monthly Family Engagement activity. She communicates daily with Sophia's teachers, sharing updates from home and learning about Sophia's day at the center. Eileen consistently seeks resources to ensure her children's needs are met. She has participated in COI's Community Conversations and enrolled in the Positive Solutions parenting education course offered by the Early Care and Education division.

Once Sophia began attending Early Head Start, Eileen started working at a local fast-food restaurant and has since been promoted to Assistant Manager. With COI's assistance, she has secured permanent housing for her family. Eileen has done an exceptional job creating a safe and nurturing environment for herself and her children, always prioritizing their needs. She attributes her support from COI as one of the key factors that facilitated her successful transition to single parenting.

# Chautauqua Lake Dental Donates to Children's Center



The donation included dental bags to be distributed to children attending the drop-in Center. The children loved picking out what color toothbrush they wanted to take home, and also received toothpaste, stickers and a tooth brushing sand timer. One little girl was so thrilled with her dental bag that she asked if she could take one home for her little brother, and of course she did!



### COI Helps Family of Six with Home Safety Hazards

The Healthy Homes team recently had the privilege of serving a large family consisting of five young children. Three of these children are under the age of six, meaning they are at a developmental stage which is most vulnerable to the effects of lead poisoning. At least one of these small children was already known to have elevated levels of lead in their system. The case was referred to COI by the Chautauqua County Health Department (CCHD). The case was deemed to be of high priority due to the number of children in the household and the amount of lead hazards present within the home.

COI permanently removed lead hazards from the home. Part of this process includes hosting an open house where lead safe certified contractors conduct a walk-through inspection of the home and meet the residents before submitting a sealed bid for the project. At the open house it was apparent that this home had more safety



The residents of this home were not only thankful for the lead abatement work completed but showed even more gratitude for the fact that we were able to go above and beyond to ensure they had a home where they could safely raise their children. The current HUD Lead Hazard Reduction Grant includes a Healthy Homes Supplement which will allow COI to continue the practice of repairing safety hazards on lead abatement projects that are not necessarily lead related. These funds are another tool for COI to assist community members with stabilizing and maintaining their housing.

retail and small-bulk distributor for Growers' Co-Op Concord, Niagara, and Catawba Grape Juice Concentrates, as well as Tart Cherry Juice Concentrate—all sourced from Westfield, NY. Growers' Co-Op, founded in 1929, represents approximately 90 local farmers and more than 3,000 acres of grapes in the Lake Erie Grape Region.

Melissa's dedication to food safety and quality is evident. She holds a food processing license from the State of New York Department of Agriculture and Markets, and has completed training through Cornell's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences to earn her HACCP certification. This rigorous training ensures CK Natural Fruit Juice follows strict food safety practices from raw material sourcing to final product distribution.


