Mandated Reporter

Mandated Reporters are required to report suspected child abuse or maltreatment when in their official role or professional capacity and when they are presented with a reasonable cause to suspect child abuse or maltreatment.

Reasonable cause to suspect child abuse or maltreatment means that based on your rational observations, professional training and experience, you have a suspicion that the parent or other person legally responsible for a child is harming that child or placing that child in imminent danger of harm.

What is Abuse and Maltreament?

Abuse encompasses the most serious harm committed against children. An abused child is one whose parent or other person legally responsible for his or her care inflicts serious physical injury upon the child, which creates a substantial risk of serious physical injury or commits a sex offense against a child.

Maltreatment means that a child's physical, mental or emotional condition has been impaired or placed in imminent danger by failure of the child's parent or person legally responsible to exercise a minimum degree of care.

How to Recognize Child Abuse and Maltreatment

Indicators of physical abuse can include:



- Injuries to the face and/or sides of the head
- Frequent injuries of any kind such as bruises, cuts, burns, bites or grab marks
- When a child is unable to provide an adequate explanation of the cause of the injury
- · Aggressive, destructive or disruptive behavior
- · Passive, withdrawn or emotionless behavior
- Fear of going home or fear of parent

Indicators of Maltreatment include:

- Obvious malnourishment
- Excessive fatigue
- · Stealing or begging for food
- Lack of personal hygiene care
- Dirty clothing
- Untreated eye care, dental care or other medical attention
- Frequent absences
- · Being left unattended or without supervision


Our theme for the MOYC 2025 is:

Environment Grant
















Cultural competency also ensures that every child feels seen, heard, and valued within the learning environment, creating a sense of belonging and acceptance.









