## **Department of Health and Human Services**

As many of you know, The Office of Children and Family Services and our local Department of Health and Human Services have worked together to create a waiver that waives certain guidelines and raises the income eligibility level to allow more families to receive child care subsidy financial assistance during this time. Using the table below, please refer to the income levels under the 85% NYS Median Income to determine if your families are eligible during this time.

### **Federal and State Income Eligibility Levels**

Family Size	85% NYS Median Income	200% Federal Poverty Level
1	\$42,405	\$24,980
2	\$55,453	\$33,820
3	\$68,501	\$42,660
4	\$81,549	\$51,500
5	\$94,597	\$60,340

#### **Subsidy Payment Frequently Asked Questions**

- Do GFDC and FDC need to have a contract with DHHS for their families to apply for subsidies if
  they currently had no families on subsidies> If yes what would that entail? If no would the
  families get paid direct? No they do not need to contract. It would be paid to the parent if they
  choose not to contract.
- 2. For Full time school aged and 3-4 year olds who were not full time: Question it won't let providers put in the current hours they are providing care what should they do I assume that these providers are doing web submittals. It should allow them to enter any time that they provided care. It will require an override by the pay clerks when approving the time sheet, however, we have worked out a process with Fiscal that they will override as long as the provider enters a comment in the notes that says "Child is now attending full time due to the school closures in response to COVID-19".
  - a. in order to get paid for their absences or to get paid for their new full time status For absences the provider may bill for the number of hours that the child would have been there normally. If they were part day before that is what they should be billing for.
- 3. Who notifies families that they do not have to pay the family portion? The family must contact the child care worker in order for the change to be made on their case. With the exception of the families that are newly applying under the increased income guidelines of 85%, those will automatically be waived by the child care worker. If we are being billed only for an absence we will waive the family fee on those cases also.
- 4. Are programs that have to close due to COVID-19 concerns, either because all families have pulled out and/or they have a household member with health conditions or are of an age that makes them especially vulnerable, being offered payment of any kind? If so, for how long? Yes. Licensed or Registered daycares can be paid for closures for 30 days.
- 5. Are absences that qualify for payment only those due to child being part of a quarantine order?
- 6. Are qualifying absences for school age children full day due to school closures or before and after school hours? Absences would be only for the hours they would have normally attended. For example, if a child was attending only after school for 3 hours, the absence should be billed for 3 hours. If the child is now attending for a full day instead of part day, the provider should make a note that the child is now attending full time due to the school closures in response to COVID-19 and the full day will be paid.
